of our very own up and coming young Scientists. Hannah Rainforth and Chrystal Wipaki, both beneficial shareholders and both in their final years of Science studies in their field.

Features of special mention that were visited and found are: near Ohutu Hut rare plants pikirangi, scarlet mistletoe; Makirikiri Tarns—a tussock habitat (area has range unusual flora); the Stoat Trapline; Carnivorous snail (pictured) Powelliphanta marchantii. We spent our last night at Ruahine Corner Hut and went kiwi listening late into the night and yes we did hear them.

Te Potae o Awarua

As mentioned in our last Newsletter this is a joint research project between the Trust and DoC to measure the behaviour of stoats by setting traps every

100 meters for 20km. We get predator control that helps preserve our native flora and fauna. DoC has been successful in getting funding for an extension and are going to put 3 lines around the Ikawetea Valley area. The lines are regularly monitored.

Out of interest in the latest stoat check, 6 stoats have been caught. Also sighted are a pair of whio with 6 ducklings on Potae Creek.

Kiwi Project

Late last year three kiwi eggs were flown out of the Ruahine Ranges as part of an "Operation Nest Egg." It is thought by the experts and those working on the ground that these are the last sprinkling of remaining Ruahine kiwi. It is hoped this project will boost kiwi numbers. It involves removing kiwi eggs from the wild, hatching them in captivity and raising chicks until they are over 800gm (this is when they are better able to defend themselves from stoats). They are then returned to the wild.

The first to hatch was named Rubick and then on 20/11/07 this beautiful chick pictured here aptly named 'Camo' was born. Camo is short for camouflage because of his/her unique color feathers that blend so well into the vegetation. Interestingly they cannot tell the gender of a chick until they send feathers
